Review:

Clinical Levels in Management

Ayurveda describes four foundational pillars of treatment—the *Chikitsa Chatuspada*: *Bhishag* (physician), *Upastha* (attendant), *Rogi* (patient) and *Dravya* (medicine). Modern healthcare similarly places the patient at the centre of all clinical activity, making them the primary focus of Level 1 care.[1]

At this microsystem level, patient assessment is crucial. Classical diagnostic tools such as *Dashavidha*, *Ashtavidha* and *Trividha Pariksha* guide clinical decision-making, disease staging, prognosis and therapeutic planning. The microsystem comprises the physician, paramedical team and all essential clinical tools involved in direct patient care.

The next tier is the organisational level, which requires appropriate infrastructure, skilled personnel and efficient management practices to optimise clinical performance. Institutions must comply with the equipment and facility standards outlined in Schedule VII of the Indian Medicine Central Council (Minimum Standard Requirements of Ayurveda Colleges and Attached Hospitals) Regulations, 2016 .[2]. This includes laboratories, dissection halls, *Rasashastra* and *Bhaisajya Kalpana* units, *Rogavigyan* labs, labour rooms, and operation theatres for *Shalya* and *Shalakya* operation theatres, along with functional outpatient departments.

The third level comprises the external environment, where factors such as population demographics, competition and regional health needs influence service delivery and treatment preferences

Evidence-Based Management

Modern advancements in medical science underscore the importance of evidence-based medicine (EBM) in validating and refining traditional Ayurvedic principles. While classical *Ayurvedic* texts offer strong theoretical foundations, contemporary research is essential for scientific validation and global acceptance.[3]

The integration of **Electronic Health Records (EHRs)** is a transformative step towards building *Ayurvedic* evidence through accurate clinical documentation and improved decision-making. In evidence-based practice, medicines undergo laboratory testing, controlled clinical trials and rigorous validation before routine clinical use. This approach blends systematic research with patient values to ensure effective and ethically sound healthcare delivery.

Modern Healthcare Approaches

As healthcare deals with health problems and betterment of lives, it is important to meet the community problems with better management objectives, risk management to better manage professional and their services. Data processed to information and intelligence is needed to deal with changing disease patterns and to encourage policies that could manage with the complex feedback system of health. e-health solutions should be instituted to increase effectiveness and improve efficiency and informing human resources and populations. The treatment principles of Ayurveda emphasise on treating morbidity, maintenance of health and improvement in immunity after considering rogi- roga bala after assessment of *dusya, desha, kala, bala, agni, prakuti* etc

(i) Consensus based medicine

In this operation, the physicians consider expert opinion with agreed knowledge to make decisions on diagnosis, treatment protocol and procedures. This is carried out

when references are not available. Young ayurvedic physicians largely depend on this healthcare system for treating rare and complicated disorders.

(ii) Practise based medicine

The physicians focus on outcomes of treatment as a part of observational studies which emphasises learning from practical experiences. Such outcomes are recorded and tracked with electronic health records (EHR) for creating effective database, track the efficacy of medicine and treatment, thereby creating evidences.

(iii) Precision based medicine

It uses environmental, lifestyle data to personalise the individualistic treatment protocol. This is the very essence of Ayurvedic principles where the assessment (*pariksha*) is done at various levels and methods to arrive at the most appropriate treatment for an individual namely *dashavidha atura pariksha* (tenfold patient examination)[4], *Trividha pariksha* (Involves inspection, questioning and palpation)[5] and specific examinations of *nadi, mala, mutra, jihwa*.

(iv) Value based Healthcare

This model focusses on maximising the patient outcomes with cost effectiveness with quality of care

Preventive measures with simple Ayurvedic habits like following *dinacharya* (daily regimen) and *rtucharya* (Seasonal regimen) that prevent disease occurrence to a larger extent. Some simpler alternatives include use of drugs like turmeric as excellent anti-inflammatory, antiseptic, *thulsi* for cough can all reduce the need of expensive medication and treatment modalities.

Employing trained personnel ensures accuracy and contributes to systematic EHR maintenance.

Proper assessment using classical diagnostic tools such as *Dashavidha*, *Ashtavidha* and *Trividha Pariksha* ensures accurate disease evaluation and guides therapeutic decisions. Organisational infrastructure aligned with statutory requirements, including

the equipment standards prescribed in Schedule VII of the IMCC Regulations (2016), further contributes to improved diagnostic accuracy and procedural efficiency.

Discussion

This review highlights that integrating classical *Ayurvedic* principles with modern healthcare management is essential for improving the efficiency and credibility of *Ayurvedic* hospital systems. The findings show that *Ayurveda's* patient-centred approach, rooted in the *Chikitsa Chatuspada* and classical diagnostic methods, aligns closely with contemporary expectations of personalised and holistic care.
